Corby Town Council's national nominations!

Town council leader Cllr Mark Pengelly - and Cllr Callum Reilly were shortlisted for national awards for their service to our community.

The NALC Star Council awards recognise the town and parish council sector. The ceremony took place at the House of Lords in November.

Cllr Mark Pengelly was nominated for Councillor of the Year. His nomination said "that without his vision, town events would not have continued following the loss of Corby Borough Council."

It added that Cllr Pengelly has worked hard to maintain connections in all community areas and is aware of what the people of Corby value.

Cllr Callum Reilly was nominated for Young Councillor of the Year. Elected at age 26, Cllr Reilly chaired the inaugural Pride working group,

Special awards decided by Corby Town Councillors were given to **Corby and District Lions** charitable group who celebrate 50 years this year and **Shape Dance** as the community dance group recently completed anniversary celebrations.

Cliff Morton was given the Living Legend award for his work overseeing "The Charity Pot".

All the other categories were decided by the votes of the Corby public.

Hilmi Say – who has inspired community fundraising in Corby this year, won the Public Sector Worker award.

Ronald Jeans won the Environmental Spirit award for his work tending to his allotment and helping others to grow.

The Friends of Coronation Park won the Small Community Garden award for the development of their Sensory Garden.

Ryan Storey – a teacher at Lodge Park Academy who has worked on better provision for children with additional needs – won the Educational Spirit Award.

Sophia Madden won the Creative Spirit Award for the creation of "Mad 2 Perform" to engage youngsters with the creative arts.

Shona Lomas with the SBA Project CIC won the Community Spirit award for work to provide free training to service users as well as free meals.

Sophie Findlay won the Club Spirit Award for her work with Corby Town Girls Football Team.

Northamptonshire Animals in Need of Nurturing and Adoption won the Animal Champion award.

North Northants Community First Responders won the Health and Wellbeing award for their work supporting the NHS.

Deborah Leeder who is a volunteer worker at The Autumn Centre, won the Volunteer Spirit.

Aimee Ballantyne was voted the Young Spirit award winner, having raised funds for Lakelands Hospice. **Bob's Café** won the Small Service Business Award and **Northamptonshire Emergency Services Cadets** won the Youth Organisation Award.

Grant award sees families cook up fun

Adoptive families had fun with cooking while networking - following grant funding from Corby Town Council.

A group linked to the national charity Adoption UK have met in Corby for the past four years; both in person and online. Their aim is to strengthen adoptive families with peer-to-peer support, assisting with school meetings, training, plus organising events such as picnics.

In February this year £400 was awarded from the Community Grants Fund so group members could take part in an exclusive cooking event.

This took place in November at **Kingswood Catering** in Corby and saw the families make chicken pies from scratch with children from ages 5 to 16 being supervised.

Feedback from the event included: "It helped with my

daughter's confidence and abilities to do and try new things. She thoroughly enjoyed the event and would love to do it again." Chair of Finance, Cllr Simon Rielly, said: "We are delighted to have been in a position to help fund this educational session for families. If you are part of a not-for-profit community group you can apply for a grant award of up to £2,000."
